

TIPS AND TRICKS

Julie Kessler: When making $\frac{1}{2}$ square triangles (HST) cut your squares at least $\frac{1}{2}$ inch larger than the unfinished block size and trim to the desired unfinished size. This gives you perfect HST squares and you will be so happy with the accuracy of your blocks.

Example for 2" unfinished HST: cut the square $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches and trim after sewing the 2 squares apart and pressing open.

MORE QUILTERS' BACK STORIES

As I was growing up, my mom made just about all the clothes for me and my two sisters. She even made our bathing suits. I absolutely loved picking out the fabric for my new Easter dress each year. Mom used to take in mending and alterations and I would help her sometimes. I'd stand there and hold the fabric while she worked the seam ripper. So, from the beginning, fabric and sewing has always been a part of my life. I loved going with my mom to the fabric store. I took Home-Ec in 6th grade with Mrs. Hayworth and made my first item by machine-a blue bag with a handle. I remember practicing on my Mom's old Singer (she still has it!). We were given a piece of paper and with no thread, we would learn how to guide the needle and "sew" on the printed lines of the paper. There was a fabric store in downtown Kendallville and I used to go in there and just wander around, looking at and touching all the fabric.

As a senior in high school (1977) I took a needle arts class taught by the Home Ec teachers at East Noble HS. I remember learning the basics of quilting from Mrs. Dorothy Koons. After high school, I had other things to occupy me, like college and then marriage and children. I did a lot of counted cross stitch during that time. Eventually, however, I came back to quilting, probably in the late 1980's, and I never stopped.

My favorite part of quilting is still looking at and picking the fabric that I want to use in a pattern and then the piecing of the design. If I could have someone else do the cutting of the pieces and then the binding after it's quilted, I would be very happy!!
